ANNUAL BUDGET MEETING Minutes Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church Sunday + November 20, 2022

Congregational Budget Meeting – Fiscal Year 2023

Call to Order: Meeting was called to order by Kim Surratt at 10:21 am. The meeting was in person and also live streamed. A quorum was present for the meeting.

Agenda: Bill Keyes made a motion to accept the agenda, second by Tom Ritter. Motion approved by congregation.

Opening Prayer: Led by Pastor Kristen

Presentation of 2023 Budget: Daryl Hogbin presented the proposed 2023 budget. During the presentation Daryl highlighted the Mortgage fund projection and the current cash on hand. Approximately 59% of the congregation returned pledges and giving patterns were reviewed for those that give regularly but did not return a pledge. It was noted that there is a shortfall in this budget that is similar to what the projected shortfall was for last years budget. It was also noted that we have had increased giving and decreased expenses for this year to make up some of the difference. Discussion from the congregation included a suggestion to look into different building insurance to see if we could get a better rate and also looking at phone and internet providers to determine if we could decrease the expense.

Congregational Vote on Budget: A motion was made by Karen Sherer to accept the proposed budget, second by Bill Keyes. Voting was conducted by paper ballot for in person and via text message for online participants. After count of the ballots the proposed 2023 budget was approved.

Adjournment/Close in Prayer: Motion to adjourn by Tom Ritter, seconded by Sydney Meyer. Motion approved by voice vote. Pastor Kristen closed the meeting with a prayer. Meeting adjourned at 10:56 am.

2023 Synod Assembly





The adjustment to an online assembly will allow us to conduct the necessary business of the synod while being considerate of the voting members' time and travel as well as the congregations' finances. This also allows us as a synod to reduce our green house gas emissions in line with SA 22.05 which was passed at our 2022 assembly.


Pastor Kristen's Report...

Early on in the COVID-19 pandemic I ordered a print by Jennifer Bloomer that became a guiding theme for me, as so much of life was being turned upside down. The image is a shoot coming up out of a tree trunk that has been cut down. You can see the roots of the tree beneath the soil. And you can also see how the shoot is reaching out towards the sun. The words that go with this image are: *May we grow back, not to what was, but instead towards what we can become.*

I feel like the year 2022 was the beginning of our growing *towards* what Shepherd of the Hills can become, post pandemic. It was our first full year of in-person worship since the pandemic began (with only a brief hiccup in January). We stepped out in faith with the budget. And thanks to an especially generous yearend gift, we ended up very close to budget. And we continued the generous support of community ministries. We also reached beyond our four walls to collaborate with others.



I believe that collaboration is the key to the church's new reality. During the heart of the pandemic we found new ways to connect across boundaries of place. We learned that not every congregation has to do everything, all by themselves. We worked smarter, not harder.



Several congregations in the Eastern Missouri Conference made an effort to continue to collaborate in ministry, even after going back to our sanctuaries. In the Fall of 2022, Pastor Mellissa Woepple and I decided to try leading a Bible Study on Zoom for the churches in the Conference. We met online for seven weeks for conversation and study on the book of Genesis, together with five different congregations in the conference.

The Eastern Missouri Conference also put together a great collection of resources for the Advent and Christmas Season called, "Great Expectations". I was one of the leaders on that planning team. And I can tell you that those resources were used by congregations throughout the country...and by us and Shepherd of the Hills. One of the resources was a daily devotion, which included devotions by our own Lisa Hogbin and Julie Hutson.



Pastor Kristen's Report ...

Sparked by a single phone conversation, we partnered with St. Mark Lutheran in Clayton to host the first Lutheran World Relief in-gathering of kits in several years. We loaded up 422 boxes of kits that were brought in by 16 congregations in the St. Louis Metro area, as well as kits collected from Central Missouri congregations.



Shepherd of the Hills found new partners in the community in 2022, as well as maintained our support of our "usual" benevolence partners. In the fall we began sharing the sanctuary on Sunday afternoons with the Promusica chorus. Directed by Henry Hwang, and accompanied by Alphie Kiu, this community choir has appreciated the use of the sanctuary for their practices. Hopefully they will sing for worship sometime next year!

The church council also took time this year to explore the possibility of hosting a childcare center. We learned a lot through those conversations. And while that particular partnership did not come to fruition, it opened our minds to the possibilities of hosting other ministries or organizations from the community.

As we continue to grow towards what we are becoming through God's leading, I pray that we may continue to look for more ways to collaborate. May we look for partners, both in the wider church and in the community, with whom we can make a positive difference in the lives of others. And in doing so, may we take a shared step into God's future.

May God's peace go with us into 2023!



President's Report:

Dear Congregational Members of Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church:

As I sit here looking at this blank piece of paper, I am struggling with 'how in the world do I summarize 2022?' As a member of Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church Council, there are many remembrances to highlight, while also looking forward to what we want to cultivate in 2023.

Earlier in the year, we revised COVID protocols which included going mask optional for worship, (although the Communion Servers still wore masks). The Choir and Special Music resumed, as well as Fellowship time for our members with coffee and snacks.

During the Spring of 2022 Confirmation met once a month on Sundays with a focus on Lutheran Living. Students Nowah Tokpa and Sam Martin prepared for their Affirmation of Baptism.

We made improvements to our equipment which included a new office computer replacement and a new projector in the sanctuary.

We can't forget our Little Free Pantries! We had the front doors replaced on the LFP (Little Free Pantry), as well as added the Little Free Library to the Hygiene pantry.

Through the memorial of Gloria Holdsworth, we received handbells and established the Handbell Choir.

Throughout the year, our congregation continued with our generous giving in support of other local, national, and international organizations and ministries. In 2022 we collected a total of \$1968.06 to donate to LuMin St. Louis, Lutheran Disaster Response (Ukraine), ELCA World Hunger, Global Farm Challenge and Bridge Bread. We also continue to donate to CHM, Community Helping Ministries.

We opened up our church facility for the Promusica group to use the church for practice, and will continue to review how we can use our church to support our communities. We also partnered with St. Mark's in Clayton to be a collection site for Lutheran World Relief (LWR).

I am looking forward to 2023, and partnering with this congregation to focus our resources to grow Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church.

Things we were able to accomplish in 2022:

- Gave rides to church for members in need of transportation
- Printed Certificate of Appreciation and made books marks for the "retiring" Church Council Members as a token of appreciation for their service to the congregation
- Collected Donations for **Butterfly House**: 52 winter coats, gloves, hats, children's clothes, shoes, toys, food items, and cash
- Installed a Little Free Library in half of the Hygiene Pantry (see Little Free Pantry report on page 28)
- 2023 calendars and planners were delivered to St. Patrick's Center.
- Collected donations for Fisher House: Cash, gift cards, puzzle books, snacks and other items
- Margaret Keyes, in her card ministry, sent out 1,392 sermons/church updates to members unable to attend services in person. She mailed out 892 cards for prayer requests and special occasions. Margaret also maintains the email prayer chain.

- ♦ a place where the spiritual, emotional, and physical needs of the pastor and lay professional are tended to

Equally important is our role in encouraging and recognizing the positive impact their work and ministry has on our congregation. We are grateful when concerns are brought to us in the spirit of Christian love and care for all members of SOTH. While the Mutual Ministry Team is unable to solve every problem, we always seek God's guidance in helping us respond with Christian wisdom and love as we seek to mutually minister to each other.

In 2022, the team did not meet with either Pastor Kristen or Lauri Anderson.

Going forward into 2023 this team needs to be reorganized. If you would be interested in being a member of this team, please speak with a member of Church Council. Confidentiality is an extremely important factor to these meetings.

Three to four new members are needed. This team typically meets a few times a year on an asneeded basis.

Stewardship Committee

The Fall stewardship theme was "Go Tell the World: 4 Traits of a Life of Stewardship." This resource offered a glimpse into just what it takes to steward a whole life of faith by examining four aspects of discipleship as it relates to life, money, and community.



Based on the Revised Common Lectionary texts for the month of October, we explored **faith**, **gratitude**, **persistence**, and **humility** in worship, all while naming and claiming the baptismal call to tell the world of God's love in Jesus Christ.

In addition to supporting the ministry of Shepherd of the Hills, this congregation was also generous in its support of other local, national, and international organizations and ministries.

Quarterly we collect coins (our "noisy offering") for four different organizations. In 2022 we collected:

- φ \$90.80 for LuMin St. Louis
- φ \$1,585.00 for Lutheran Disaster Response (Ukraine)
- φ \$135.80 for ELCA World Hunger, Global Farm Challenge, and
- φ \$156.46 for Bridge Bread.

Which is a total of:

\$1,968.06

Seasonally we have events that include a collection of money as well as in-kind offerings. This year,

- φ The Souper Bowl of Caring collected 191 items and \$172.00 for Butterfly Haven, and
- φ For God's Work Our Hands we collected and packed items for **23 Personal Care Kits** for Lutheran World Reflief.
- φ We hosted the St. Louis LWR Ingathering with St. Mark in Clayton when we gathered and shipped:
- φ 422 boxes of LWR Kits that included 1,335 quilts, 670 Personal Care Kits, 635 School Kits, 167 Baby Care Kits, and 45 Fabric Kits.

Special offerings are collected during the seasons of Advent/Christmas Eve, and Lent. In 2022 we collected:

- φ \$543 during Lent for Oaks Indian Mission and
- φ \$622 during Advent/Christmas Eve for Butterfly Haven, as well as
- φ Winter coats, hats, gloves, and other items.

All in all, Shepherd of the Hills supported 7 organizations with \$3,305 in cash as well as nearly the same amount in in-kind items. What a wonderful witness of God's work in the world!

It was the Committee's plan to spend \$6,000 of the earnings from 2021, but that would have driven the Fund value below the \$101,111 contribution ceiling. The Committee would like to reserve the \$3,636 above our ceiling for use during 2023 when the market has improved. The Fund will continue to be monitored for growth potential.

The money we spend will be split between the local Charities, Youth, and Older Age ministries.

Each will be getting at least 10% of the money.
