National Day of Prayer May 3rd

In 1775 the Continental Congress allocated a time for prayer in forming a new nation. Over the years, there have been calls for a day of prayer, including from Presi-

dent Abraham Lincoln in 1863. On April 17, 1952, President Harry Truman signed a bill proclaiming the National Day of Prayer into law in the United States. President Reagan amended the law in 1988, designating the first Thursday of May each year as the National Day of Prayer.

Through the efforts of the National Day of Prayer Task Force, more than 35,000 prayer gatherings will be conducted by about 40,000 volunteers across the United States. Several million people are expected to participate in this call to prayer. Other events in various communities across the United States may include: choirs and bands performing songs relating to prayer; community prayer breakfasts or luncheons; daytime prayer walks; and evening worship and prayer services or gatherings. National Day of Prayer is a time for people of all faiths to pray together in their own way.

Locally, there will be a gathering at the Bridgeton Government Center (and most city halls) from 12Noon to 1:00 p.m. and one at the Arch from 7-9 p.m.

A word from Pastor Jeff...

D ear Friends, The month of May reaches its climax on the Day of Pentecost, which occurs this year on May 27. Remember to wear red that day, for it is the color of the Holy Spirit, and it is the sending of the Holy Spirit that we celebrate. We truly have a sending God. God the Father sent God the Son, who sends us the Holy Spirit, who sends the church into the world in his name.

This sense of being sent on mission into the world is at the heart of the Book of Acts, which we have been following in our narrative lectionary on Sunday mornings. I am enjoying this series of readings very much, because it includes many stories that are not usually included in the Sunday scripture readings. The Book of Acts shows how the risen Christ continues to bring God's blessings as his mission and ministry go on in the world through his people by the power of the Holy Spirit.

I think about this issue of sending as we get ready to celebrate our son's graduation from college this month. He has no idea yet where he will live or what he will do. We only know that he is not coming home. He is ready to spread his wings and fly. It's very exciting for us, and it's exactly what we have raised him to do, but the uncertainty of the future still makes his parents nervous. How glad I am to know that he is not sent out alone, but has a living Savior in his heart and the Holy Spirit to guide him.

I also think of this issue of sending in relation to Shepherd of the Hills, as you move closer to calling your next pastor. There is uncertainty in not knowing who this person will be or how long this process will take. Yet some things are very clear. You have your mission set out before you in the SOTH 2016 Vision for Embodiment that came out of your PMC process. You know that the Lord has carried you through many transitions and changes in the past. You have active members and committed leadership. You have the support of your brothers and sisters in the synod and the ELCA. And best of all, you have a living Savior and the Holy Spirit to guide you. With the Spirit alive in our midst, life is exciting, meaningful, and full of hope and joy.

Way to Go, Sydia!



R itenour High School senior Sydia Darker has signed a letter of intent to run track for the University of Missouri-Kansas City next fall.

Sydia is a three-time state medalist. At the Fort Zumwalt West Invitational track meet in April, she brought home the championship in the long jump, finished second in the 100-meter hurdles and fourth in the 300-meter hurdles.

As a junior, Sydia won three all-state medals at the Missouri State High School Track & Field championships in the 300-meter hurdles, 100-meter hurdles and the long jump. She was fourth-best in the state in the 300-meter hurdle with a school-record time of 45.34 seconds.

Narrative Lectionary

Last fall SOTH began to follow an alternative selection of scriptures for Sunday worship called the Narrative Lectionary. Most churches use the Revised Common Lectionary, which is a selection of readings designed to fit with the sea-

sons of the church year, including a reading from the Old Testament, Psalms, the Epistles, and the Gospels for each Sunday. It is called the common lectionary because it is used by many Christian denominations. The Narrative Lectionary was designed to take a different approach, based more on following the Biblical story in historical sequence rather than seasonally. In this approach, the fall is used to give an overview of the Old Testament, from creation to the prophets. Then in December one of the Gospels is chosen to be read straight through until Pentecost.

SOTH has been trying out this approach since last fall. The gospel of Mark has been the major text on Sunday mornings. Sometimes there have been longer portions of scripture read than is true of the common lectionary, but a portion of a Psalm is the only other reading that day. Most of the book of Mark has been read during this period of time. Since Easter, there have been readings from Acts and some of the Epistles. The Narrative Lectionary does not cover the summer months, so congregations are free to use whatever scriptures they wish. Many use this as an opportunity to do a special series on a particular topic or a book of scripture.

The worship committee would like feedback from the congregation regarding the use of the Narrative Lectionary in the future. If we continue with the Narrative Lectionary, Sundays in the fall would begin once again with an overview of the Old Testament (using different readings than last fall). Then in December, the Gospel of Luke would become the reading each Sunday, going straight through the book as written. The alternative would be to return to the Revised Common Lectionary. Please let Pastor Jeff or a member of the worship committee know how you feel about this issue. There will be an opportunity to do so during one of the worship services in May.

Church Committees: Finance

e will be highlighting committees and groups in the upcoming months, letting you know what they do and what their needs are. This information will also be put into a booklet to be included in new member packets.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee provides oversight on all financial account matters of the congregation, including counting and depositing of all offerings, and developing the congregational budget. Much like any household, the church needs to know it's expected income and how much of that income to allocate to various expenditures. The Finance Committee takes on the responsibility of allocating the church funds each calendar year. Based on information provided by church members on their "Intended Giving Statements", the committee projects what the total income will be for the year. Then, based on requests and budgets from various other committees, the annual budget for the church is put together for approval by the congregation.


Dear Shepherd of the Hills,


